

Dementia Research Advisory Team Updates





The **Dementia Research Advisory Team** is a group of people living with dementia and carers/supporters who are involved in dementia research as co-researchers. The members are supported by The Alzheimer Society of Ireland to contribute to dementia research in a Person Public Involvement (PPI) capacity. This means working alongside the research community throughout the research process - from devising research questions all the way to presenting findings at conferences.


Throughout 2022 the members used their insights and expertise to collaborate on **13 ongoing projects** across a variety of universities. They **spoke at workshops and conferences** (both nationally and internationally!), **reviewed tender documents and funding applications** and excitingly, started to carry out their own research!

From selecting their research question, to designing their recruitment poster, hosting focus groups and devising survey questions, the members have been investigating "The impact a diagnosis of dementia has on the person who becomes the caregiver / supporter."

If people living with dementia and caregivers would like to contribute to this innovative research opportunity, there is a link to their brief survey below. (Please note, this survey closes on Wednesday 21st December at 5pm.) Important to note is that members of the Dementia Research Advisory Team come to us with no previous research experience. Lived experience of dementia is the only requirement to join the team.


Research Strategy 2022-2024 officially launched

The Dementia Research Advisory Team

The Dementia Research Advisory Team is a group of people living with dementia and carers/supporters who are involved in dementia research as co-researchers. Ensuring the lived experience of dementia is at the heart of dementia research the members influence, advise, and work with researchers across Ireland. This is known as Person Public Involvement or PPI.

The members are currently supporting 15 different research projects. They have worked with researchers to devise survey questions, develop research materials for potential participants and shared insights into the practicalities of moving a research project off the page and actually engaging with people affected by dementia.

Over the course of the coming months we look forward to the members sharing their PPI experience with audiences in UCD, Trinity and Maynooth.

PPI Song Writing Workshop

In the famous words of Hans Christian Anderson; "where words fail, music speaks". Dementia Research Advisory Team members Gerry, Helen & Kevin have been involved as PPI contributors in Lisa Kelly's PhD research since October 2020. This research, supervised by Prof Hilary Moss & Prof Ita Richardson, aims to explore how telehealth music therapy may support community dwelling people with dementia and their families, particularly those who live in rural or isolated areas.

Gerry, Helen & Kevin alongside their partners and supporters Nuala, Carmel & Helena recently attended a songwriting workshop at the Irish World Academy of Music & Dance at the University of Limerick. The workshop was facilitated by established songwriter, Carl Corcoran, and co-facilitated by the lead researcher on this project, Lisa Kelly.

Lisa says "Thanks to a PhD student bursary from PPI Ignite @UL, we were able to meet in person for the first time, after having Zoom meetings for the last two years. Safe to say plenty of craic was had!"

The songwriting workshop aimed to capture the importance of PPI in dementia research in a creative, nontraditional way. The song is entitled 'Who Will We Tell'. It is hoped that once further funding is secured, the song will be professionally recorded and disseminated to the public. We can't wait to hear it!

The Dementia Research Advisory Team at the Alzheimer's Disease


International Conference

5 things older LGBT+ people need you to know

Dr. Sinéad Hynes & Megan Oglesby from NUI Galway recently gave staff at The Alzheimer Society of Ireland a wonderful presentation on their work "Developing consensus-based recommendations for the delivery of dementia services for the LGBTQIA+ community in the Republic of Ireland".

This research identifies the future needs that older LGTBQIA+ people and their care partners living in Ireland have in relation to dementia care service delivery, and 2) develops consensus-based recommendations for dementia service provision in Ireland.

This research has been highlighted as part of RTE's Brainstorm.

TeamUp for Dementia Research

The **<u>TeamUp for Dementia Research</u>** service launched in July 2021. From the outset it has been an incredibly active and varied service.

Already in the first quarter of 2022, we have offered our members 7 different research projects - from surveys to focus groups to one-to-one interviews.

If you have not yet matched with a study please do not be concerned. Our recently launched <u>Research Blog</u> covered the very important topic of "Inclusion & Exclusion Criteria" (ie,<u>how</u> <u>you are matched with a study</u>). It will only be a matter of time before a study relevant to your interest area comes up.



Other Research Opportunities

Though the TeamUp service is dynamic and fast paced, it is still in its infancy - we cannot say yes to every research project. The Alzheimer Society of Ireland has long recognised that research is improved by having more people involved. We would therefore like to highlight some research opportunities (outside the scope of the TeamUp service) below. The contact details for the relevant researchers are included.

Non-verbal Communication

Dr. Aviva Cohen and her team in UCD have developed an innovative new app called Empathic. This unique app aims to help people who are no longer able to communicate verbally to independently communicate their emotions.

It uses artificial intelligence to interpret short recordings of non-verbal vocalisations.

Aviva and her team are now looking for people who fall into the above category, as well as with their formal and informal care providers, to trial the app.

Children of People with Young Onset Dementia

Cathal Blake is completing his PhD through the School of Psychology in Dublin City University. The focus of much of his research work to date has been people affected by Young Onset Dementia.
