Welcome to our final newsletter of 2021! It has been quite a busy year for us all. We want to highlight some of the work we've been doing over the last 12 months.



Spring / Summer Highlights

• **Report Publication: A Year of Caring and Coping with Dementia During Covid-19.** This work was conducted by the Research & Policy team with support from The ASI Operations team. This report was a large body of work undertaken that sought to understand the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on the lives of people with dementia and their carers one year on. The report brings to light the enormous challenges faced by the family carers of people living with dementia – and the urgent need for access to support services. 

This event is specifically designed for researchers, however it is open to all.





New Research: Nutritional Supplements & Dementia Research

Prof John Nolan and Dr Rebecca Power at the Nutrition Research Centre Ireland (NRCI) at Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) and Prof Ríona Mulcahy at University Hospital Waterford have investigated the role of nutritional carotenoid supplements for people with Alzheimer's Disease.

Prof Nolan, along with a study participant Hilary, recently spoke on the Pat Kenny Show on Newstalk about the center's research trial further. These plant-based supplements showed many improvements in mood and memory for participants. To listen back to the show, please click <u>here</u>.

Dementia as part of a Chronic Disease Management Programme

In May 2021, The Alzheimer Society of Ireland published a policy paper, which was commissioned and worked with Prof Suzanne Cahill & Dr. Maria Pierce which investigated the feasability of including dementia in a revised chronic disease management programme for GPs. 
